
Resolution: Give from the Heart

After 21 years, we should be used to your generosity and devotion to the cats. But, to be honest, you floored us in 2024.

Our 2024 finances were aided by the fact that expenses grew by a mere 7% from 2023. But the real hero in this story is you: our donations grew by 49% from the previous year.

This left the cats with a tasty \$653,234 in net income. In addition to propelling us comfortably into 2025, we are now able to position Tabby's Place for long-term sustainability, with much needed reserve funds:

 The Operating Reserve will allow us to weather unforeseen emergencies,

- and to take advantage of unique opportunities (such as discounts for large volume purchases).
- The Capital Reserve will cover both the replacement of equipment and capital improvements.

You can see the breakdown of expenses in the chart on the previous page.

As usual, medical costs were our

largest category, taking over 30% of our total expenses.

I am honored to work with you to save even more cats who need the unique love that Tabby's Place can give. I look forward to keeping you posted on some exciting projects and improvements we have in the works.

Fostering Kindness

When you support Tabby's Place, every one of our cats is part of your family. You are here with us every day: brushing Fergie in her solarium, giving Dewie his insulin in Quinn's Corner ... and falling asleep with kittens on your forehead.

Wait, what?

At any given time, over 30 Tabby's Place cats live "off campus" in our foster network. This enables us to help *more* cats, and to provide a higher

level of *individualized care* for cats on life's margins.

Our Foster Program includes:

- Kitten Fosters: Fragile babies need 'round-the-clock care. Without a skilled cadre of foster families, Tabby's Place would have to turn away newborns and orphans like Lilo. But your giving supports a robust training program. In 2024, foster families nurtured 186 kittens into secure, healthy toddlers ready for adoption.
- Forever Fosters: Some of our cats have extraordinary needs best served by our world-class vet team.
 Forever Fosters provide them with the comfort of a home, plus lifelong medical care at Tabby's Place.
- Hospice Fosters: Once a cat comes to Tabby's Place, they join



a family where love never ends. No cat faces terminal illness alone, and some spend their final chapter in the fairytale setting of a home. Hospice Foster families know they will face the sorrow of goodbye. Yet greater still is the joy of being a cat's heaven on earth.

Resolution: Make Someone the Center of Your World


But the little Persian seemed to know the world needed him, too.

Anxious, aggressive, or traumatized cats often have fewer options than cats with physical ailments. These distressed cats may be first to be euthanized at public shelters.


But Tabby's Place has a Behavior Team who never gives up on a cat. That's a life-saving promise for friends Resolution:



Positively Loved: Mr. Man

If you've ever felt nervous about cats with feline leukemia virus (FeLV), you're not alone. Visitors sometimes hesitate to enter our Quinn's Corner wing, afraid they'll be heartbroken at the sight of frail cats.

Allow us to introduce you to Mr. Man.

Built like a sharp-dressed walrus, Mr. Man is a one-cat conga line whose music never stops. Our tubby tuxedo's biggest problem is deciding whether to snuggle the nearest cat or human.

He also happens to be FeLV+. Allow Mr. Man to help you bust some myths:



Resolution: Bust Myths

 Myth: FeLV+ cats are frail and sickly.

FACT: Most FeLV+ cats enjoy good health. They are more susceptible to infections (such as upper respiratory viruses) and certain forms of lymphoma. But these zesty cats can live long, "normal" lives. They are generally not sick until their final illness, at which time palliative care is advised.

- Myth: If you pet FeLV+ cats, you can bring the virus home.
 FACT: FeLV is spread by casual contact between cats, such as mutual grooming and sharing bowls. There is no way you can transmit it to your cats at home.
- Myth: FeLV is expensive to care for.
 FACT: Most FeLV+ cats do not require "extra" care, other than a high-quality diet, low-stress environment, and regular veterinary visits (like any other cat).
- Myth: FeLV is a form of cancer.
 FACT: Although it has the word "leukemia" in the name, FeLV is a retrovirus (like FIV), which attacks



the immune system.

 Myth: FeLV+ cats should not be available for adoption.

FACT: These phenomenal cats are as affectionate, goofy, and tenderhearted as any others, and they thrive in loving homes. In 2024 alone, Tabby's Place adopted out seven FeLV+ cats. Although they should not be integrated with uninfected cats, FeLV+ cats live safely with other species, or with fellow FeLV+ cats. Why not adopt two?

The letters F-E-L-V are far less interesting than L-O-V-E.

Weeks later, I found Hummus in a pile of blankets in his suite, snug as a bug. He accepted pets with soft uncertainty. I scratched under his chin and realized, "I might be the first person who ever pet him."

I applied to adopt him minutes



later. A connection was carved in stone. I knew in my quiet, patient household, he would grow to become a sweet and loving companion.

Hummus pairs great with Salami, though, so I made sure to bring him home too, after his miraculous <u>victory</u> against FIP.

They became inseparable. Pets, cuddles, and playtime are met with unbridled jubilation.

It fills my heart every day to know they are home, safe, happy, and loved.
